

Mission Accomplished: Making a Difference 120 Students at a Time

The enrichment for Kindergartners at Cedar Forest Elementary School about George Washington and the American flag went incredibly well. 120 students went home to tell their moms and dads they saw George Washington; who was no different from them when he attended school at their same age. George Washington was a student learning the same subjects with his whole life ahead of him.

Little eyes opened wide when they comprehended that the American flag, as a symbol, incorporated everyone in the room, much like the flag's blue canton that symbolizes the union that incorporates the 50 states. The students listened eagerly especially when they realized they too could do good things for others, by giving of themselves in order to be leaders in school and in their communities. They realized that they too have their whole lives ahead of them to aspire to greatness and possibly be- one day- the President of the United States of America.

The 501(c)3 nonprofit Educational Enrichment for Young Patriots, was founded in 2007. Since then, over 10,000 students have benefited from enrichments delivered to schools directly in the classrooms at no cost. Currently, the elementary schools at Wilderness, Cedar Forest, Brock Road, and Riverview are involved with or have enjoyed our services in the past.

Educating our youngest generations must begin in Kindergarten. To that end the Educational Enrichment for Young Patriots provides sustained instructional enrichment K-5 in history and civics. Each student receives a grade and curriculum-specific enrichment throughout six grades until graduation into middle school. The civics component reinforces the requisite knowledge and skills for informed, responsible participation in public life and develops a basic understanding of good citizenship. It instills relevant skills for students to deal intelligently with controversy. Students develop an understanding of the values and principles of American constitutional democracy and of some of the key issues in the functioning of a democratic Republic. They are made aware of their rights but at the same time made to understand the consequences of not following the rules and laws that govern a civil Republic.
